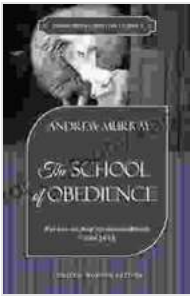


If Ye Love Me Keep My Commandments: A Journey into the Heart of Christian Obedience

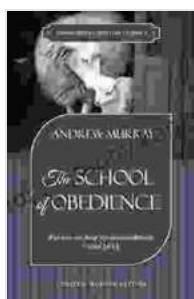
