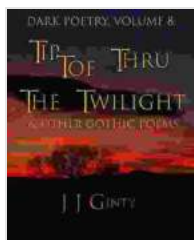

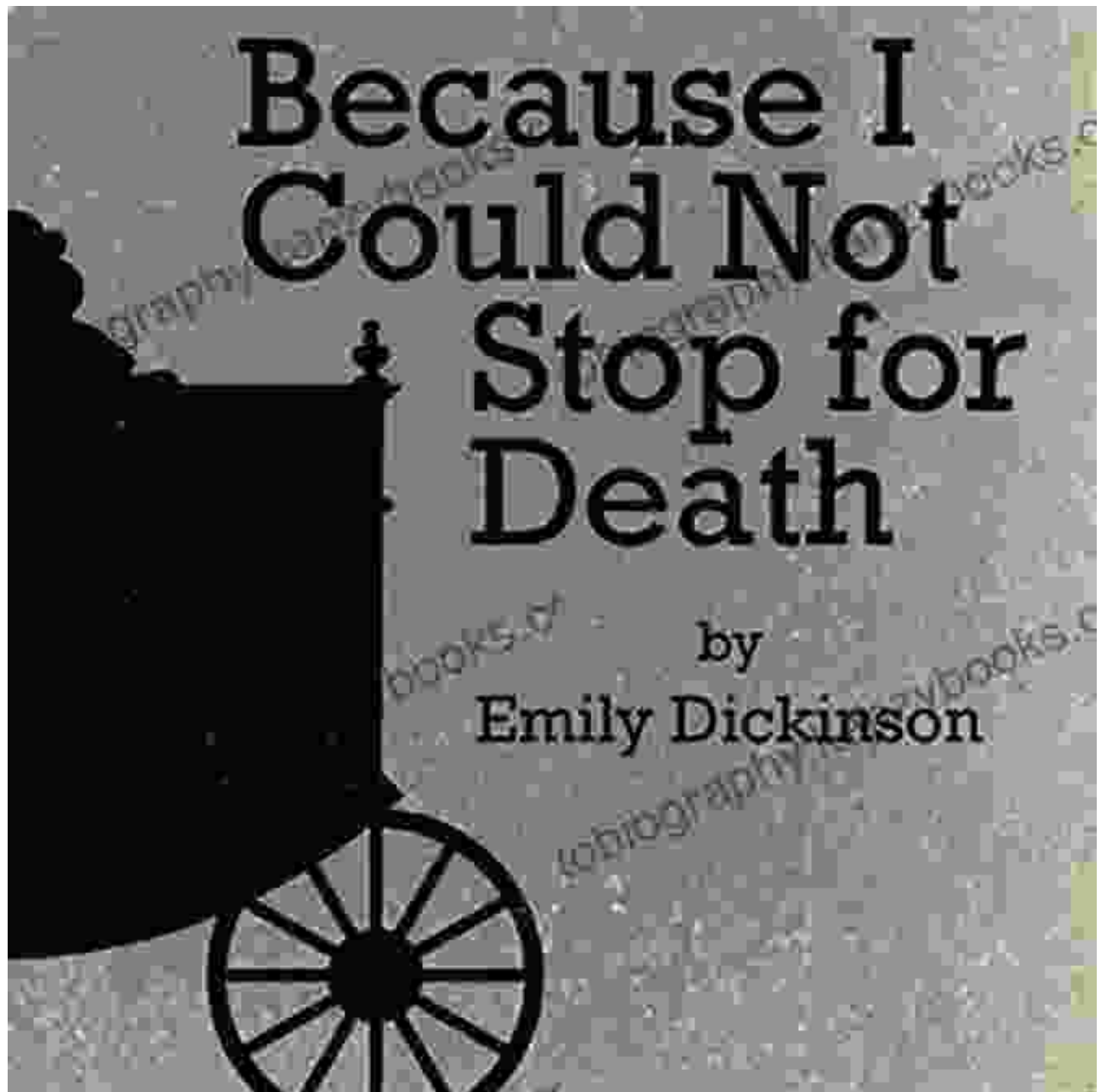
Once upon a midnight dreary, while I pondered, weak and weary,

Nameless here for evermore.

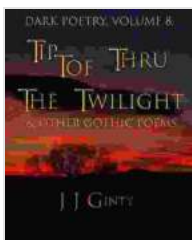
Edgar Allan Poe's famous poem 'The Raven' featured in 'Tiptoe Thru the Twilight'

The cover of 'Tiptoe Thru the Twilight' anthology



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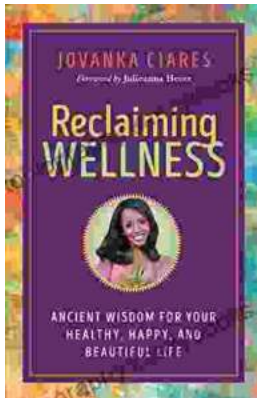
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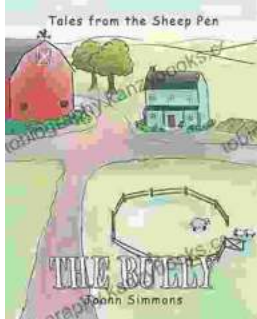
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
